Official State Dog Breed of Texas

Texas designated Blue Lacy as the official state dog breed on June 18, 2005. The Blue Lacy dog breed was developed in the mid 1800's by the Lacy Brothers of Burnet County, Texas (Frank, George, Edwin, and Harry Lacy). The family is said to have used greyhound, scent-hound, and coyote stock. The Blue Lacy is officially recognized by the National Kennel Club (NKC).

We went out to the west at first to see the beaches. Then we came back into town to see the East Beach.



After lunch, we travelled up to tour the Bishop's Palace:


Galveston's grandest and best-known building, the Bishop's Palace is an ornate delight of colored stone, intricately carved ornaments, rare

woods, stained-glass windows, bronze dragons and other sculptures, luxury materials and furnishings, and impressive fireplaces from around the world (including one lined with pure silver!).

Built by lawyer Colonel Walter Gresham and designed by Nicholas Clayton, Galveston's premier architect, this Victorian castle was cited by the American Institute of Architects as one of the 100 most important buildings in America. The home was built from 1886 to 1892.



The Pleasure Pier. It has rides the kids like and a great restaurant. It costs \$35 entry fee and has made parking along the seawall a nightmare!




Randy and Kay on the Moby Duck. Mary and I were on the other side. Of the boat.

And afterward, we always visit the water gardens



which are not too far away and very impressive!
