Fort Bend Art Center

There is a **HUGE** building in Rosenberg , Texas. It was originally a telephone company building, but was taken over by the Republican National Committee. After they left, Bill Butler (the man who owns the building) had a **HUGE**, empty building! The rent was \$4000 per month. A deal was made between Bill Butler and Diana Miller (current president) and Kathy and Don Golden about whether they would like to start a gallery there. He would charge them \$2000 per month and pay the utilities. He would use it as a charitable write-off. They accepted! There are a lot of rooms that they could rent as "studios". That, by itself paid Mr. Butler the rent.

The Art League of Ft Bend was a small league of maybe 60 to 70 members. That changed a LOT after artists from the area were attracted to the gallery. They now have around 250 members! The members who signed up for the gallery have to pay a fee for doing that but it isn't much for a whole year!

And thus began our beautiful art gallery in Rosenberg and it was worth it! We have a very beautiful art gallery!. Every gallery member has to

work 2 days a month, but it is well worth the time! Our thanks go to Diana, Kathy and Don for setting this in motion.

Dena was busy getting the place ready for the BIG spring show! This man was involved with stone artwork. The toadstool you see is all stone and VERY pretty!




Dena already had several paintings from her group displayed on the back fence.



Another bedroom. ALL were VERY colorful and pretty!



The roadside had a never-ending beauty of the bluebonnets. I've seen better years than this one, but this year was still breathtaking!




Beautiful Bluebonnets along the way from Fredericksburg to Llano.
